## TWO STATE SOLUTION TO ISRAELI PALESTINIAN CONFLICT

The General Assembly,

Fully alarmed by the serious threat that is being posed to both the Israelis and the Palestinians as well as the threat that is being posed internationally,

Recognizing how deeply appreciated the Jewish state of Israel is, as well as how the Palestinians cherish their homeland,

Guided by the continual violence that is occurring, coming from both sides of this argument, as stated in the article *Israelis and Palestinians Killed in the Current Violence*; “At least 1,195 Israelis and 9,128 Palestinians have been killed since September 29, 2000” (Israelis),

Alarmed by the number of fatalities that have occurred in recent years, and those that may come in future years if this issue is not addressed immediately,

Seeking a more peaceful middle-east and for the surrounding countries of Israel to make peace with them,

Bearing in mind the conditions the Palestinians have been living in for tens of years in surrounding countries they were forced unto, as paraphrased in the article *Palestinian Refugees and the Right of Return* (Palestinian),

Deeply concerned of these conditions that the Palestinians have been living in for so long, as stated in the article *The ongoing Nakba: Sickness and health among Palestinian refugees in Lebanon*, written by Rosemary Sayigh: “Most dwellings (96 percent) are built of concrete and light-weight materials, poor in insulation. Furthermore, 58.8 percent lack safe and stable drinking water; 13.9 percent lack sanitation, 45.7 percent lack electricity or a stable connection, 67.2 percent have a poor indoor environment” (Sayigh),

Guided by the serious threats being posed to millions of lives, a two state solution to this ongoing issue will be the most beneficial for the futures of both Israel and Palestine,

1. Welcomes the returning of the Palestinians to the pre-1947 borders, resulting in a two state solution to this ongoing issue;
2. Supports the recognition of Palestine as a state:
  - (a) This includes the identification as a country in the eyes of the United Nations;
3. Confirms that there will be secure and safe borders between the two states of Israel and Palestine;
4. Reaffirms that all Israelis in the land that will now be considered Palestinian land shall vacate the land that was not previously theirs:
  - (a) This includes the abolishment of all illegal settlements of Israelis in Palestinian land and Palestinians in Israeli land;
5. Draws the attention to those who would rather be granted citizenship in the surrounding countries that the Palestinians were originally forced into:
  - (a) Proposes that all countries with Palestinians currently titled as 'refugees' will be awarded citizenship in the country they are currently taking refuge in;
6. Requests that all orders in this resolution be completed within the next three (3) years;
7. Expresses it's hope for peace in the middle east through this two state solution to the ongoing Israeli Palestinian issue;
8. Further reminds both the Israelis and the Palestinians that peace will ultimately be the best solution for this issue.
